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## Building Positive Change

For the past 40+ years, the landscape and culture of Moravian Manor has experienced significant change. During those years, we've had the privilege of providing specific services and accommodations that afford those who live here the opportunity to create oneself endlessly.

One of the most significant and recent change is the welcome addition of Warwick Woodlands. Built on the strong foundation and reputation of Moravian Manor, Warwick Woodlands is an expansion of our residential living and lifestyle offerings. This sister community has thrust our current community in a positive direction, better positioning us to explore new ways to enhance our vision and mission.

Since opening the doors to Warwick Woodlands in November of 2016, we have welcomed over 70 new residents. By the end of this year we will have nearly doubled our residential living population. Our growth does not stop there; plans for groundbreaking of The Woods apartments are underway. This fall we will break ground on our 54 unit apartment building (36 apartment homes already reserved) featuring underground parking, the Owl's Nest Restaurant and Sippery as well as other areas of interest such as the SmartFit Studio and Tree Top Terrace. Construction is expected to take 12 to 18 months with anticipated move-ins sometime in late 2018 or early 2019.

What's next? With a Priority Depositor list of 150 strong, we will start accepting reservations on Phase II of the Carriage Homes and Townhomes sometime in early 2018. Construction of Phase II is based on achieving a pre-sale goal and therefore, will be announced at a later date. Once construction on Phase II begins, we will complete the West 6<sup>th</sup> Street extension which will connect Woodcrest Avenue to Orange Street (Rte. 772).



There are often questions about how the addition of Warwick Woodlands has impacted Moravian Manor. The Residential Living waiting list for homes on the Moravian Manor campus has tripled over the past three years with an approximate wait time of 3-5 years depending on the specific style home. The increase in popularity is not solely due to the addition of Warwick Woodlands. The advertising of Warwick Woodlands may have been the vehicle which has driven interest to the Moravian Manor campus; however, the appeal of Moravian Manor and all it has to offer speaks for itself.

As an organization, Moravian Manors, Inc. has built two amazing campuses both with their unique set of offerings and lifestyle providing residents and potential residents with

Over the years, I have seen the results of "group think" many times. Recently, it has resulted in the Manor West

Personal Care renovation and addition. The early renditions are nothing like the final design. The first design of the Hendricks Place began with sketches of apartment buildings; nothing close to the final product. Warwick Woodlands is another example of many ideas getting deleted, modified, or blessed by group collaboration. During a recent morning walk through Warwick Woodlands, it was truly inspiring to see the many ideas come to fruition.

In regard to the Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Heart Club band, it is intriguing to hear Giles Martin's thoughts on the original product. "The thing about Pepper is they all remember it incredibly fondly because it was a great collaborative and, for my dad, it was probably the best work experience of his life."





## RESIDENT SPOTLIGHT

*Mark Hirschman...*

Life, Love  
and the  
Pursuit of  
Helping  
Others

**MARK ALBERT HIRSCHMAN**, the son of Herbert and Ada Hirschman, recently shared with me that he is most fulfilled in life when helping others.

Born in Manhattan, Mark, a very shy boy, spent the first eight years of his life in the lower east side of New York. That is until his father's work swept the family to Beverly Hills, CA. Mark's father was a producer/director of Broadway shows, television and eventually movies. This exposed Mark to a variety of cultural opportunities, including a year in London during his eighth grade year. Mark and his family returned to sunny California where he graduated from Beverly Hills High School. He continued his education at Oregon State University for undergraduate and two years of graduate study. In 1976, Mark completed his graduate studies in Philadelphia, earning a Master of Arts in Interdisciplinary Studies, which included sociology, psychology and the history of psychiatry. His entire professional career has been in community behavioral health, always working for non-profit organizations. While beginning his career with a focus on helping woman and teens with depression, Mark rounded out his career with a specialized focus in the treatment of heroin addicts using medication assisted treatment.

In 1980, just a few years after completing his education, Mark met his wife Fran through mutual friends. "There was

an immediate, mutual attraction," exclaimed Mark. "Fran and I had a lot in common; she was educated, had her MA in psychology and, yes, beautiful too." Married in 1984, Mark and Fran made Gladwyne, PA their home until eventually moving to the Hendricks Place townhomes at Moravian Manor in 2012.

When asked what life event or person has most impacted him, Mark noted that his year in London really helped him mature and get a "world perspective;" but he also mentioned Vicky, a girl he dated around his sophomore or junior year of college. Mark shared that the young woman was the first person who ever really encouraged him to stay true to himself. He remembers her telling him, "Don't be what you think other people want you to be; just be yourself." From that point forward, Mark discovered a new-found confidence, was more outgoing and evolved into the man he is today.

While Moravian Manor's "Community within a Community" approach to living and the connectivity to downtown Lititz was attractive to Mark and Fran, it was ultimately their personal experience with our staff and nursing care that brought them to Moravian Manor. Back

in 2000, Fran's mother was diagnosed with Dementia/ Alzheimer's. They learned of Moravian Manor's specialized memory support program and were very impressed, and without hesitation placed the care of Fran's mother, and for a short period for rehab, Fran's father in the Manor's care. Because of their personal experience, Mark and Fran began to support the Manor's ministry through ongoing financial contributions. Years later when touring the nursing renovation project, they were reunited with a staff person who immediately recognized Fran and began reminiscing about time spent with Fran's mother. Even after all these years, you can hear the emotion in Mark's voice as he shares this story; an interaction Mark describes as a defining moment...the moment they knew without a doubt that there is no place they'd rather be than Moravian Manor.

Mark's love of creating and working with his hands, coupled with his passion for helping others, has led to his involvement in the community on and off campus. On campus, he spends time pursuing new hobbies and connecting with others through wood carving, woodworking and even learning how to play the ukulele. Mark also continues to help others at Moravian Manor through his presentations to both staff and residents about bullying and aggressive behavior, Drugs 101, Relaxation and Meditation. Off campus, Mark volunteers his time and knowledge by actively participating at the Board level with ASAP Lititz (Action for Substance Abuse Prevention), a local group of



volunteers providing support, education, and awareness about substance abuse in our local area.

Moravian Manor and our local community are thankful for Mark's ongoing contributions and his continued passion for helping others.

However, Rob has been part of Moravian Manor family since 2014 when his beloved Jane was admitted to our skilled memory support nursing unit. Jane was diagnosed with Alzheimer’s disease in 2012; this was certainly a shock to both Jane and Rob. Rob recalls Jane having a brain that was second to none, conversely, the disease significantly and negatively changed this. Rob found himself as Jane’s primary caregiver for two years, and in spite of his efforts, Jane’s disease progressed to a point where Rob needed medical assistance from qualified caregivers.

Moravian Manor staff was blessed to have served Jane during her progressive disease process and recalls Rob being by Jane’s side eight to 10

hours daily. Jane lost her battle to Alzheimer’s disease on December 14, 2014. Rob now refers to his cherished wife as “Angel Jane” and expresses the care provided to his Angel Jane was outstanding and beyond the normal call of duty. Rob states, “The medical staff went far beyond my expectations”.

Nowadays, you often find Rob out for his morning walks, soaking up the sun or around the community volunteering with events, delivering mail and newspapers, welcoming new residents to the campus and assisting anyone that comes through the front door. Rob greets everyone with his charming smile and distinct Boston accent.

Rob’s new objective in his remaining years is to be as positive as possible, each and every day. Rob quotes, “On January 2, 1961, John F. Kennedy in his inaugural address stated, ‘Ask not



what your country can do for you, Ask what you can do for your country.” Rob attempts to live each day by this rule and encourages everyone to do the same. Live each day as follows, “Ask what you can do for your fellow Moravian Manor resident and your fellow Moravian Manor employee.”

Moravian Manor is blessed to have this wonderful man as part of our extended family. The next time you see Rob around campus, please thank him for his positive influence. He truly is a light in our community.

## Resolve and Desire to Help Others Moves Teen to Obtain His CNA



For Dakota Hoak, a Warwick High School senior, the impact of a personal trauma influenced and helped spark a passion for the health care field that, according to Amy Blough, Vice-President of Human Resources for Moravian Manor, sets him apart from most 16 year olds.

“I remember the day he came in to see me,” said Blough, “He said, ‘I have my CNA certification and I’m 16, will you hire me?’”

Blough was impressed and surprised that someone so young would take the initiative and time to become a Certified Nursing Assistant. “My jaw dropped when I heard he had his CNA at 16; it’s really unheard of.”

“So, with the collaborative input and support of Donovan, our Director of Nursing, we decided to give him a chance. We were very optimistic and wanted to encourage the intense passion we saw in Dakota. He’s the first one I know to be hired at his age in the nursing field at Moravian Manor. He’s been working here since September 2016 and it’s going very well.”

Dakota’s motivation came when his father (who was in his 50s) suffered a stroke. Dakota had been thinking of pursuing a medical career prior to this life-changing event, but it served to strengthen his resolve and desire to help others.

“I knew I wanted to pursue getting my CNA certification, but I was nervous and scared because I didn’t have a medical background at all. I completed my CNA (clinical and classroom) training at Stone Ridge Town Center in Myerstown through a program run by Harrisburg Area Community College (HACC) last July through August 2016. I think that succeeding in getting my certification helped to build my confidence. I was the youngest one in my class.”

“Such passion and focus at such a young age is not typical of 15-16 year olds. When Dakota approached me with his request, I couldn’t help but think of my own kids (age 16 & 17). I don’t think what he did is typical at all. There aren’t many kids that would have the confidence in order to take this kind of initiative. Dakota has great drive, ambition, and passion for the nursing field and it shows,” said Blough.

According to Blough, Dakota started at Moravian Manor as a bath aide and would help feed the residents, etc. They initially limited his role, because of his age. When he mastered those areas and got more confident, then they expanded his responsibilities.

Now, Dakota spends his time in a variety of units and he especially enjoys his interactions with the residents.

“What I like best about working at Moravian Manor is how friendly everyone here is. The residents are really personable, and I like how everything operates. It’s a great place to work,” said Hoak.

“We love having him here,” said Blough, “We have enjoyed getting to know him. We are so glad to have the chance to work with him and can give him the opportunity to experience the nursing field in this way.”

So what does the future hold for Dakota? “I am so glad they gave me the chance. I am grateful for the opportunity to work here at Moravian Manor. It has served to strengthen my desire to one day become an RN, or possibly a nurse practitioner. I plan on going to Pennsylvania College of Health Sciences. Lancaster General Hospital (LGH) has a new campus they just opened last fall,” said Hoak.

For now, Dakota has a year of high school to complete. He will split his daily schooling between Warwick High School and the Lancaster County Career and Technology Center’s (CTC) Brownstown campus in the advanced health career program. Dakota is looking forward to attending the CTC as it affords him the opportunity to obtain college credits and shadow health care professionals in a variety of clinical settings.

According to Blough, “There is a high need for people like Dakota going into the health care setting. He will not have any problem finding a job. We would like to congratulate him on his efforts and wish him the best in his future. Moravian Manor is thankful to have the opportunity to give Dakota this wonderful experience, setting the foundation for his future.”

What advice would Dakota give to others who want to pursue their dreams? “Go out and DO IT!”

Reagan enjoys all of the stimulating activities, but says her favorites are experimenting, exploring and playing in the



## Manor Team Member "Pieces" Together the World of Publishing

Delores Walker is a familiar face around the Manor, having worked in housekeeping for 12 ½ years, 10 of those in the Garden Court Apartments. But what many may not know about her is that she is a published author! We sat down recently with Delores to chat about this endeavor and how it was a family project.



**What is the name of the book?**

"The book is titled, 'Peter, the Pouting Puzzle Piece.'"

**What inspired you to write it?**

"I grew up putting jigsaw puzzles together and often lost a piece. This book is a God-given inspiration. The story just came to me. I wrote it about 20 years ago, put it on a shelf and was looking for an illustrator. I asked one person about the illustrations 20 years ago, but that's didn't work out. Another person started it, but couldn't finish. In October 2016, I discovered that my niece was doing children's book illustrations!"

**So who is the illustrator?**

"Lauren Smith, my niece. Lauren read the book and I shared the other illustrations from the previous person and she agreed to complete it."

**Have you always like to write?**

"My whole family has always read books. Growing up, we didn't have a television, so we read. I always enjoyed writing poems in school, and there are other writers in my family too."

**What is the story about?**

"Peter, the Pouting Puzzle Piece' is a story is about a character, a puzzle piece, named Peter. He was feeling discontented and lonely, because he didn't feel important as his other brothers and sisters. This story was written to inspire others...to show them that no matter what our personality is, we are still important and we each have a place in the world. When we aren't here, it leaves a hole."

**What's your favorite part of the book?**

"My favorite part is when Peter felt mischievous and ran around the room, dodging table legs and skipping around because he felt happy – because he loved being exactly where he belonged."

**Do you plan to write other books?**

"I would like to write another book. I journal and jot down anything down that comes to mind."

**How did you find the publishing process?**

"The publishing process felt scary and intimidating.... all communication was via e-mail and telephone. It was a little complicated and overwhelming to do that. While I had fear and anxiety about it, I felt support from my family and my husband helped me through the process. I feel that completing this made God happy for me to share this story and experience with others!"

**Tell us a little more about yourself.**

"I'm from Lancaster.... grew up in Mainheim and attended Manheim Central High School. I'm married to David Walker. We have two children and a granddaughter; children are Davita (36) and Andrew (33), and our granddaughter will be 6. We've lived in Lititz for the past 13 years."

**What do you like best about working Moravian Manor?**

"I really enjoy the people – the residents and staff. I like meeting so many different kinds of caring people."

## Walking A New Path of Healing & Meditation

If you're feeling stressed or just need to unwind, there's a new addition to the Outdoor Recreation Area at the Manor that you might want to check out. Eric Matt recently completed a Walking Labyrinth as his Eagle Scout Project.



A Labyrinth is an ancient pattern found universally in our world as a method of meditation. Dating back to ancient times, evidence of labyrinths have been found in all corners of the world from ancient Greece to the Indian

tribes in North America. Catholic Churches constructed in the Middle Ages used the labyrinth as a symbol for salvation. A labyrinth is often confused with a maze. A maze is intended to get you lost and it requires logical and analytical thinking to find the exit. A labyrinth is not a maze, it has only a single path where the entrance leads you to the exit. Today, labyrinths are used as a metaphor for our spiritual journey; many twists and turns but no dead ends. The labyrinth integrates both your mind and body to help release spiritual tension and reflect within.

We recently sat down with Eric to learn more about himself and his project.

**When did you get into Scouting?** I joined Cub Scouts in the fifth grade upon the encouragement of a friend of mine. Through the years, I have embraced hiking and nature activities. I am currently a member of Troop 154, chartered by the Lititz Church of the Brethren.

**How did you decide on your Eagle Scout Project?** Through the guidance and support of Mark Hirschman, a resident



at Moravian Manor, who I have come to know through Socrates Café. I participate in Socrates Café along with other students at Warwick High School each month. We come to Moravian Manor and meet with a group of Residential Living residents for discussion. It has been a very worthwhile activity. It is "really cool" to hear the residents view point on our topic of discussion, and they enjoy hearing our viewpoint, too.

**How long did it take?** Planning began in summer 2016, and the Labyrinth was dedicated in November 2017.

**How is it made?** The first layer is a base of stone, followed by a layer of woodchips. The outline is made from rope and garden stakes. Mark was involved in the entire process from research to completion.

**How do you use the Labyrinth?** The choice to enter the labyrinth is the only conscious choice you will have to make. Once you are within the boundaries, simply follow the path until you have reached the center and then return. You will not get lost because the entrance is the exit. As you enter the labyrinth you can focus your thoughts on a question or concern or you can choose to walk the path with a silent mind. The journey is the goal and in a labyrinth, as in life, there is no one single right way to walk the path.

**What is next for you in Scouting?** Time management is a big thing for me right now. I'm going into my senior



year of high school, I have a part time job as a math tutor at Mathnasium in Lancaster, and I'm looking at colleges. However, I plan to continue to attend Scout meetings and helping with outings.

**What are your plans after high school?** College. Possibly majoring in physics or computer science. My parents hope I select a college closer to home, but I prefer to head north. I have visited Cornell, Bucknell, and RPI (Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute).

### Summer Peach Salad with Balsamic Chicken

#### Ingredients

6 cups spring mix lettuce ¾ cup red onions, fresh, sliced thin  
6 breasts Balsamic Garlic Chicken (recipe below) sliced, ½ pound peaches, fresh, sliced  
3 tablespoons sliced blanched almonds, toasted  
6 ounces Honey Lime Cilantro dressing (recipe below)

#### Instructions

1. Place 1 cup spring mix on plate or in appropriate-sized container.
2. Top with 1/8 cup red onions, 1 sliced chicken breast, 3 fresh peach slices, 1/2 teaspoon toasted almonds and 1 ounce Honey Lime Cilantro dressing.

### Balsamic Garlic Chicken

#### Ingredients

1 ¾ teaspoons balsamic vinegar  
1/2 tablespoon garlic, fresh, chopped  
1/8 teaspoon kosher salt  
1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper  
1 tablespoon + 1 teaspoon canola oil  
6 chicken breasts (4 ounces each), boneless, skinless, raw  
¾ teaspoon oregano leaves, fresh, chopped  
¾ teaspoon thyme leaves, fresh, chopped

#### Instructions

1. Combine vinegar, garlic, salt, pepper and oil. Whisk until well-blended for marinade.
2. Add chicken. Toss until evenly coated. Hold refrigerated for 1 to 2 hours to marinate. Drain and discard excess marinade.
3. Place chicken on an oven-safe pan. Sprinkle 1/8 teaspoon oregano and 1/8 teaspoon thyme over each breast.
4. Preheat char-broiler or grill.
5. Place chicken on a clean and well-oiled char-broiler or grill. Cook for 1 to 2 minutes on each side or until well-marked.
6. Transfer to sheet pans. Bake in a preheated 375 degree F standard oven for 5 minutes or until minimum internal temperature is at least 165 degrees F (for 15 seconds). Cool under refrigeration.

### Honey Lime Cilantro Dressing

#### Ingredients

1/8 cup + 1 tablespoon canola oil blend (80% canola, 20% olive)  
1/8 cup + 1 1/4 teaspoon unseasoned rice vinegar  
1/8 cup + 1-1/8 teaspoon honey  
1 Tablespoon + 3/4 teaspoon Dijon mustard  
3/4 Tablespoon cilantro leaves, fresh, minced  
3/4 Tablespoon fresh lime juice  
1/4 teaspoon Chinese sesame seed oil  
1 1/4 teaspoon red peppers, fresh, minced  
1 1/4 teaspoon yellow onions, fresh, minced  
1/8 teaspoon kosher salt  
1/8 teaspoon ground black pepper

#### Instructions

1. Whisk ingredients together until thoroughly blended.
2. Refrigerate until used.

## Music and Memory Certification Provides Residents with Transformative, Therapeutic Benefits

A year ago, Chaplain Rich Thierolf, along with Staff Members, Robin Work and Sharon Krushinski, attended a screening of the documentary, "Alive Inside: A Story of Music and Memory." The impact left a lasting impression on the three; inspiring them to bring the program to Moravian Manor.

*Alive Inside* is a joyous cinematic exploration of music's capacity to reawaken our souls and uncover

the deepest parts of our humanity. Filmmaker Michael Rossato-Bennett chronicles the astonishing experiences of individuals around the country who have been revitalized through the simple experience of listening to music. His camera reveals the uniquely human connection we find in music and how its healing power can triumph where prescription medication falls short. The stirring documentary follows social worker Dan Cohen, as he fights against a broken healthcare system trying to

demonstrate music's ability to combat memory loss and restore a deep sense of self to those with dementia.


